The Crocker is the "longest continuously operated art museum in the West" was founded in 19985 and remains the leading art institution for the California Capital Region and Central Valley. The Museum offers a diverse spectrum of special exhibitions, events and programs to augment its collections. The Museum pushed the envelope in recent years with exhibits such as Irving Norman, M.C. Escher and Marsden Hartley.
